The Importance of Children in Nature

We thoroughly enjoyed reading Last Child in the Woods by Richard Louv, both as a staff and with some of our parents. This book initiated an international dialogue around the concept of 'nature deficit disorder.' While our community does not suffer this affliction, in fact, avoiding it is one of the main things that has brought all of us together, we are still inundated by the effects of our society's increasing detachment from our environment.

This book serves as a warning to all of us that we must make a concerted effort to reverse the trend of forcing our children into a hyper-scheduled, artificial existence. An important takeaway is the fact portunities to help them grow as such.

We discuss often in our program the relationship between freedom and limits. The freedom that we find in nature is intertwined with the, literally natural, limits we find therein. These natural limits teach young children in much deeper, more impactful ways than words ever can.

One reason we wanted to encourage everyone to read this book is that we hope it can serve as an aid for having

the conversations that will continue to help the outdoor education movement to grow and thrive.

As is apparent to us in our program everyday, for children "in a natural setting... their social standing [becomes] based less on physical abilities and more on language skills, creativity, and inventiveness. In other words, the more creative children emerge as leaders in natural play areas." These are precisely the values and skills we hope to inculcate in our students and the outdoors proves to be an important partner in providing the opPlease take a moment to consider:

How does being outdoors lend itself to unstructured play?
A time when boredom has allowed you or a child you know to create or imagine.

- What are some skills children practice when left to be responsible for their own entertainment, engagement, or activity?

- How much more a child learns when the space for failure is left open for them.

- A time you or someone you know has felt the effects of 'directed-attention fatigue.'

- The connection between a child's relationship with their environment and their future understanding of civic duty.
